WELCOME

HOLY WEEK AND PASSIONTIDE

It is still uncertain when Christians first began to make an annual (as opposed to a weekly) memorial of the death and resurrection of Christ. This *Pascha* (from the Hebrew *pesach*, meaning 'Passover') was at first a night-long vigil on Easter Eve. Over time, the *Pascha* developed into the articulated structure of Holy Week and Easter. Christians share in Christ's own journey, from the triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday to the empty tomb on Easter morning.

INTRODUCING OUR HOLY WEEK PREACHER

Fr Charlie Annis CR is a member of the Community of the Resurrection, Mirfield. He took his simple vows fifteen months ago, is a poet and preacher, and is studying Carmelite Spiritual Direction. His sermons before Compline on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week will have the theme 'The Economy of Salvation'.

READING

Monday 25 March

Isaiah 55.1-11

A reading from the prophet Isaiah.

Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat!

Come, buy wine and milk

without money and without price.

Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labour for that which does not satisfy?

Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food.

Incline your ear, and come to me;

listen, so that you may live.

I will make with you an everlasting covenant, my steadfast, sure love for David.

See, I made him a witness to the peoples,

a leader and commander for the peoples. See, you shall call nations that you do not know,

and nations that do not know you shall run to you,

because of the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, for he has glorified you.

Seek the Lord while he may be found, call upon him while he is near;

let the wicked forsake their way,

and the unrighteous their thoughts;
let them return to the Lord, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.
For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord.
For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it.

Tuesday 26 March

Romans 8.18-28

A reading from Paul's letter to the Romans.

I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labour pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope we were

saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God. We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose.

Wednesday 27 March | Corinthians 3.10-15

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build on it. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ. Now if anyone builds on the foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw - the work of each builder will become visible, for the Day will disclose it, because it will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test what sort of work each has done. If what has been built on the foundation survives, the builder will receive a reward. If the work is burned, the builder will suffer loss; the builder will be saved, but only as through fire.

PSALMODY

We say the Psalm responsorially, the officiant leading and the preacher and congregation joining in with the even numbered verses. We pause at the diamond in the middle of each verse. Please follow the preacher's timing of the pauses.

Monday 25 March

Psalm 25

- I To you, O Lord, I lift up my soul; O my God, in you I trust; ♦ let me not be put to shame; let not my enemies triumph over me.
- 2 Let none who look to you be put to shame, ♦ but let the treacherous be shamed and frustrated.
- 3 Make me to know your ways, O Lord, ◆ and teach me your paths.
- 4 Lead me in your truth and teach me, ♦ for you are the God of my salvation; for you have I hoped all the day long.
- 5 Remember, Lord, your compassion and love, ♦ for they are from everlasting.
- 6 Remember not the sins of my youth or my transgressions, ♦ but think on me in your goodness, O Lord, according to your steadfast love.
- 7 Gracious and upright is the Lord; ♦ therefore shall he teach sinners in the way.
- 8 He will guide the humble in doing right ♦ and teach his way to the lowly.
- 9 All the paths of the Lord are mercy and truth ◆ to those who keep his covenant and his testimonies.
- 10 For your name's sake, O Lord, ♦ be merciful to my sin, for it is great.
- II Who are those who fear the Lord? ◆
 Them will he teach in the way that they should choose.
- 12 Their soul shall dwell at ease ♦ and their offspring shall inherit the land.
- 13 The hidden purpose of the Lord is for those who fear him ◆ and he will show them his covenant.

- 14 My eyes are ever looking to the Lord, ♦ for he shall pluck my feet out of the net.
- 15 Turn to me and be gracious to me, ◆ for I am alone and brought very low.
- 16 The sorrows of my heart have increased; ◆O bring me out of my distress.
- 17 Look upon my adversity and misery ◆ and forgive me all my sin.
- 18 Look upon my enemies, for they are many ♦ and they bear a violent hatred against me.
- 19 O keep my soul and deliver me; ◆ let me not be put to shame, for I have put my trust in you.
- 20 Let integrity and uprightness preserve me, ♦ for my hope has been in you.
- 21 Deliver Israel, O God, ♦ out of all his troubles.

Tuesday 26 March

Psalm 55.13-24

- 13 For it was not an open enemy that reviled me, ◆ for then I could have borne it;
- 14 Nor was it my adversary that puffed himself up against me, ♦for then I would have hid myself from him.
- 15 But it was even you, one like myself, ♦ my companion and my own familiar friend.
- 16 We took sweet counsel together ♦ and walked with the multitude in the house of God.
- 17 Let death come suddenly upon them;let them go down alive to the Pit; ◆for wickedness inhabits their dwellings, their very hearts.
- 18 As for me, I will call upon God ♦ and the Lord will deliver me.
- In the evening and morning and at noondayI will pray and make my supplication, ◆and he shall hear my voice.
- 20 He shall redeem my soul in peace from the battle waged against me, ♦ for many have come upon me.
- 21 God, who is enthroned of old, will hear and bring them down; ♦ they will not repent, for they have no fear of God.

Psalm 88

- I O Lord, God of my salvation, ◆
 I have cried day and night before you.
- 2 Let my prayer come into your presence; ♦ incline your ear to my cry.
- 3 For my soul is full of troubles; ♦ my life draws near to the land of death.
- 4 I am counted as one gone down to the Pit; ♦ I am like one that has no strength,
- 5 Lost among the dead, ♦ like the slain who lie in the grave,
- 6 Whom you remember no more, ♦ for they are cut off from your hand.
- 7 You have laid me in the lowest pit, ◆ in a place of darkness in the abyss.

- 19 All day long they come about me like water; ◆ they close me in on every side.
- 20 Lover and friend have you put far from me ♦ and hid my companions out of my sight.
