Magna Carta, the Great Charter of the Liberties, was agreed by King John of England in 1215 at Runnymede near Windsor where the King placed his Great Seal upon the document making concessions to England's barons. A facsimile of Magna Carta document and replica seal has been loaned to Guildford Cathedral by Salisbury Cathedral as part of the worldwide commemorations and will be displayed in the Cathedral Treasury.

MAGNA CARTA THEN AND NOW

New discoveries and new perspectives

By Professor David Carpenter Monday 8 June, 7.00pm

The lecture will explain how Magna Carta, in 1215, was designed to re-enforce a hierarchical society dominated by great lords. It asserted a fundamental principal, that the ruler was subject to the law, but excluded a large proportion of the king's subjects from any benefit. The talk will also reveal new discoveries about the four surviving originals of Magna Carta, discoveries which help explain how the Charter survived to become one of the most famous documents in world constitutional history.

David Carpenter is a Professor of Medieval History at King's College London. He is a leading authority on Magna Carta and was on the advisory committee for The British Library's Magna Carta exhibition. His new book *Magna Carta*, published in January in the Penguin Classics series, is already regarded as a landmark in Magna Carta studies.

Workshop: Wednesday 10 June Artwork on view until 12 June

The 800th anniversary of Magna Carta is an occasion to deepen our understanding of the crucial role it has played in the development of human rights, democracy and liberty. Surrey Minority Ethnic Forum (SMEF) will take part in the celebrations by involving its members in a communal art activity which will remind us of the history behind the human rights we enjoy today. Marios Panteli a local artist will lead the groups to create a piece of 3D art on the floor of Guildford Cathedral.



RUNNYMEDE SURPRISE MAXIMUS

Sunday 14 June, 2.30pm-6.30pm

The day before the national commemoration of the anniversary, a peal called *Runnymede Surprise Maximus* will be rung on the Cathedral bells in recognition of the Surrey location where Magna Carta was sealed under oath by King John in 1215.

CHORAL EVENSONG

Sunday 14 June, 6.30pm

The same day a specially commissioned anthem will be sung across the nation during the commemorations and will be performed by the Cathedral Choir at Evensong.

MAGNA CARTA:

the Bible of the English Constitution or disgrace to the English nation?

By Lord Neuberger Thursday 18 June, 7.45pm

Lord Neuberger will start by setting Magna Carta in its historical and legal context from the Norman conquest to the confrontation between King John and the Barons, and then discusses the perceptions and influence of the Great Charter over the ensuing 800 years, and finally he explains how the two fundamental modern constitutional principles of democratic government and the rule of law can be traced back to Magna Carta, and why they are so important today.

Lord Neuberger became President of the Supreme Court of the UK in October 2012 previously he was Master of the Rolls. Appointed a Lord Justice of Appeal in January 2004, a Lord of Appeal in Ordinary in January 2007 and given a life peerage. He has led an investigation for the Bar Council into widening access to the barrister profession and also served on the panel on fair access to the professions led by Alan Milburn.

MAGNA CARTA QUILTS

800 years of history and legacy in cloth

Friday 19 June – Saturday 8 August

Magna Carta Quilters are a group of quilters living in the Runnymede area who are making a series of eight quilts to celebrate this anniversary.

Magna Carta Quilts comprise four Medieval Quilts and four Legacy Quilts. The four Medieval Quilts tell the story of how Magna Carta came to be, are rendered in a graphic novel style based on illustrations and colours used in 13th century illuminated manuscripts. The four Legacy Quilts are modern in style, and depict images and words of people who have embodied the spirit of Magna Carta by speaking out and acting on behalf of various human rights issues across the centuries. Magna Carta Quilts combine traditional quilt making skills with modern techniques and tools of textile art to create a unique and visually stunning display.




THE SIGNIFICANCE OF MAGNA CARTA

By Professor Justin Champion Monday 29 June, 7.45pm

This lecture will explore the rediscovery of the text, and significance of Magna Carta, from the first printing and translations in the early sixteenth century, through the reworking by the eminent common lawyer Sir Edward Coke, most controversially as a means to constrain the potential tyranny of Charles I in the Petition of Right 1628. The suppression and then Parliamentary publication in 1642

of Coke's long and important commentary on Magna Carta provided a resource that legitimised a series of popular resistances to the illegitimate actions of Kings, Parliaments and Courts from the times of Freeborn John Lilburne, through the eighteenth century moments of Whig radicalism with John Wilkes and Arthur Beardmore in the 1760s.

The lecture will explore how the tradition not only authorised the rule of law and due process, but empowered minorities and radical voices to successfully challenge state power. Fully illustrated!



FREEDOM: REALITY OR DREAM?

The Liberty trail from Magna Carta to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights

The Reverend Adrian Leak will trace the developing concepts of freedom and human rights, from Magna Carta to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948). He will explore the issues of licence and restraint, and examine the principle of human rights vis-à-vis the Gospel precepts of duty to God and Neighbour.

There will be an opportunity to view the Cathedral's Magna Carta interpretation project before this session.

Adrian is now retired from stipendiary ministry and is an honorary assistant priest at Holy Trinity Church, Bramley. He is a freelance writer and a regular contributor to the Church Times.



MAGNA CARTA:

Charter for our times or antiquarian icon?

What are the celebrations of Magna Carta intended to achieve? What good will be in place or under way by the end of 2015 that would not have been without the anniversary's celebration? Historical retrospect, symbolism and pageantry have real value. But we want the reality to match the rhetoric. We are bound to ask what more should we, the heirs of Magna Carta, be undertaking in our own time to do justice to this ancient document.

The Reverend Dr Robin Griffith-Jones, DLitt, is The Reverend and Valiant Master of the Temple at the Temple Church, London, and Senior Lecturer in Theology at King's College, London University. He has worked extensively on law and religion. The Temple Church is the collegiate church of the two legal colleges or Inns of Court, Inner and Middle Temple; it is famous as 'the mother-church of the Common Law'.
