

8. Now stand in front of the 'Men's Door', turn and look at the wall on your right. Count up 11 layers (courses) of bricks from the ground. Can you see a brick with '1' on it. This is the first brick made for the Cathedral and was laid by the Mayor of Guildford. The bricks were hand made using the clay which had been dug out for the foundation

9. As you continue along the side of the Cathedral there are 7 statues named after the 7 virtues:

Temperance	Hope	Courage	
Justice	Charity	Faith	Prudence

Circle the one you consider the most important.

Now walk around to the front of the Cathedral and stand by the West Doors.

10. The statues on the front are of the Transfigured Christ in the middle and on either side men and women chosen because their lives reflected the Holy Spirit. There are quotes from four of these people written down the sides of their statues. Julian of Norwich is shown holding a hazelnut and has her saying; *'What is this? It is all that is made'* See if you can find these words (it is not easy).

Which hand is it, left or right?

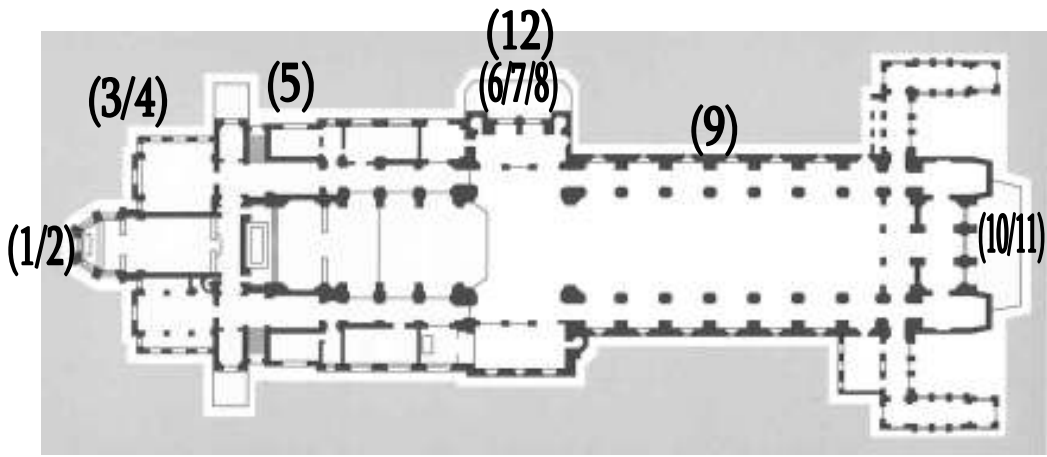
12. Stand at the bottom of the steps. Look up at the Cathedral. How does it make you feel? Can you describe it in words?

1. This cross was put up in 1933 to mark the spot where the Cathedral would be built. It is called The Ganges Cross. This is because it was made from the wood of an old Royal Navy ship which was called 'HMS Ganges'. What animal was on the ship's badge?



2. This end of the Cathedral houses the Lady Chapel. Outside there are four statues of Ladies. Nearest the car park is Lady Margaret Beaufort. She is looking towards Woking where she did some of her many good works. Looking at her clothing would you guess she lived in

5. Notice that some of the drainpipes have the Bishop's mitre and the date they were put in place stamped on them in Roman Numerals. If

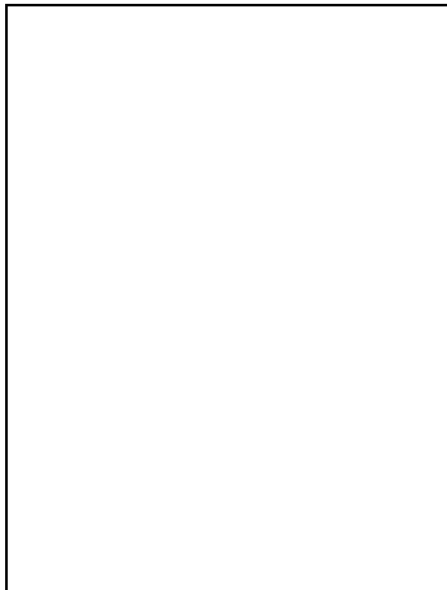
