# Welcome

Welcome to the Cathedral Church of the Holy Spirit in Guildford and to this celebration of the Holy Eucharist, as we gather to commend to Almighty God our dear brother Andrew, the tenth Bishop of Guildford.

In the short time that Bishop Andrew had to prepare for his death, he was inspirational. His letters to the Diocese during the past months reinforced a deep faith in Jesus Christ which had been foundational since his teenage years. During this time, Andrew also reflected upon the liturgy for his funeral, and this service is in accordance with his wishes. He requested that his commendation should take place in the context of a celebration of the Holy Eucharist, and chose readings, hymns, music and participants for this service.

Today's Gospel reading (John 11:17-27) tells the narrative of the raising of Lazarus. This is a story about grief and hope. In the same way in which Jesus wept at the grief of Mary and Martha, we believe that he is alongside us in our grief today – particularly as we support Beverly, Hannah, Sam, Joe, Lydia and the whole family. But in the words of St Paul (1 Thessalonians 4:13) we do not grieve as those who have no hope. For we believe that Jesus, who died and is risen, will come again and 'with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God the dead in Christ shall rise'. That was Andrew's faith, and it is the faith of the Christian Church.

At the heart of Andrew's ministry was sharing this faith with others, and enabling people to inhabit this hope by following Jesus for themselves. His commitment to this calling, alongside his love for this Diocese and its people - whatever their faith or background - is a key part of our thanksgiving today.

Bishop Andrew requested that donations in his memory be given to the mission and ministry of Guildford Cathedral. He was born in the year that it was consecrated, and was keen to support the Cathedral as much as possible in the launch of a new vision and strategy. I know it was his hope that gifts in his memory might help to revitalise the work of this great 'People's Cathedral'.

**W**hat then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written,

'For your sake we are being killed all day long;  
we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered.'

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

# The Commendation
