Design a Cathedral kneeler



Guildford Cathedral is currently celebrating its Diamond Anniversary. The Cathedral was consecrated in 1961 and is known as 'The People's Cathedral' for the efforts that so many people made in contributing to its completion. One of the things that were designed and made by various people were the kneelers that are used during services.

Each kneeler was designed according to specific instructions but all of them feature a unique creative design. The blue section represents Stag Hill, the location of the Cathedral, and the cream-coloured section represents the 'often cloudy skies of Surrey'. Can you use the template to create a design for a kneeler which shows something of our world and our lives as the Cathedral celebrates turning 60?

COMPETITION DETAILS

- ◇ The template will also be available to download from our website, which will also be publicised via our social media channels.
- ◇ All entries must be received by **Friday 8 October 2021**.
- ◇ Entries will be sent to the judge to make a decision on the winner(s).
- ◇ Judging will take place during the week of Monday 11 October, with the winner(s) being informed on Tuesday 19 October.

PRIZES

- ◇ The winner will receive a goodie-bag of prizes including Roald Dahl Create and Colour Set, a 'Rainy Day' Box, glittery pencils, a sticker book, a 'Rockin' Rabbit' toy, and a set of books (selected dependent on the age of the winner).
- ◇ Collection/delivery of the prize will be arranged directly with the parent/carer of the winner(s).

JUDGING

- ◇ The competition will be judged by Juliet Dunmur, grand-daughter of Sir Edward Maufe (Cathedral architect).
- ◇ The intention is for all entries to be judged alongside each other. If we are inundated with entries, we may create separate categories by age group. Each age group would then have a separate winner.
