WELCOME TO GUILDFORD CATHEDRAL

LOOKING AFTER ONE ANOTHER

We are following advice and there is no public worship taking place at the Cathedral for the foreseeable future. As neighbours the resident clergy and musicians of the Cathedral Close have each contributed to the service and we recorded it on 26 and 27 March. There may have been changes in the past few days which you would like to bring before God in your time of prayer which won't have been in our minds as we put the service together. Participate in the hymns and the prayers, reflect as the psalm and canticles are sung and engage with the sermon. As this week unfolds pray for us as we pray for you – physically separated yet united in our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

PASSION SUNDAY

The Fifth Sunday in Lent is designated Passion Sunday and the beginning of Passiontide. It is still uncertain when Christians first began to make an annual (as opposed to a weekly) memorial of the death and resurrection of Christ. This Pascha (a word derived indirectly from pesach, Hebrew 'Passover') was at first a night-long vigil, followed by the celebration of the Eucharist at cockcrow, and all the great themes of redemption were included within it: incarnation, suffering, death, resurrection, glorification. Over time, the Pascha developed into the articulated structure of Holy Week and Easter. Through participation in the whole sequence of services, the Christian shares in Christ's own journey, from the triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday to the empty tomb on Easter morning.

OLD TESTAMENT READING Jeremiah 31.27-37

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will sow the house of Israel and the house of Judah with the seed of humans and the seed of animals. And just as I have watched over them to pluck up and break down, to overthrow, destroy, and bring evil, so I will watch over them to build and to plant, says the Lord. In those days they shall no longer say:

"The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge."

But all shall die for their own sins; the teeth of everyone who eats sour grapes shall be set on edge. The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made

with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt - a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour.

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say - 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. North Guildford Food Bank

Although we aren't able to bring our donations for the Food Bank to the Cathedral they would still be pleased to receive from us. This entrance is for their guests only, so please take all deliveries to the back entrance in Applegarth Avenue.

Donations may also be left at Sainsbury's in Burpham, There is a North Guildford Food Bank trolley located by the tills from which weekly collections are made.

Items which we have been asked for are plain and self-raising flour, tinned pulses, pot noodles, marmite, nappies sizes 4,5,6 and 'Free From' pasta, cereals and biscuits.

The Food Bank is on facebook and they regularly update items which are running low. Thank you as always for your continued support.

IN A TIME OF DISTANCE

The unexpected always happens in the way
