

8. The 7 virtues

Prudence means to have good judgement and common sense. The figure of Prudence is based on Lady Maufe, the Architect's wife.

Charity is Christian love of fellow men.

Temperance is self restraint in conduct especially eating and drinking

9. The statues on the front are of the Transfigured Christ and some men and women chosen because their lives reflected the Holy Spirit. They are left to right; Lady Julian of Norwich (*What is this? It is all that is made*), Evelyn Underhill, Archbishop Michael Ramsey, St Bernard of Clairvaux (*Do you believe it a little thing to know how to live?*), St Benedict (*we go down through pride and up through humility*), Reginald Somerset Ward, Bede Griffiths and Saint Columba (*Pilgrimage for the love of God*). 10. The **right** Hand of God is reaching down from the top of the central window.

The numbers on these notes relate to the numbers on the children's worksheets.

1. The wooden cross is made from Burma Teak taken from HMS Ganges. It was placed here in 1933 to mark the beginning of the building of the cathedral. The ship's badge, showing the elephant, is embedded on the cross. There is a picture of the HMS Ganges inside the cathedral near the treasury. Behind you is the garden of remembrance.

2. The four statues on the buttresses of the Lady Chapel are (left to right) Lady Margaret Beaufort, (mother of Henry VII) who looks towards Woking.

St Catherine (with wheel)

St Martha of Bethany shown conquering Tarascus (man eating dragon, half-animal, half-fish) rather than her usual depiction of a broom, ladle or keys and St Cecilia, (patron Saint of Music).

3. The bell was first rung in December 1947 at the dedication of the crypt chapel.

The weathervane was made in Send.

The sculpture above the round window illustrates the text 'The eternal God is thy refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms' (Deut 33:27). Note the flames of the Holy Spirit under the central window.

4. The angel weights nearly a ton and is 4.6 metres high. As well as being an attractive landmark the angel is a weathervane.
