

Now when Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the lake, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: 'Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali, on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles — the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned.' From that time Jesus began to proclaim, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.'

As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the lake—for they were fishermen. And he said to them, 'Follow me, and I will make you fish for people.' Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him.

Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

I would like to say a huge thank you to everyone who supported my volunteering experience in Bangladesh with Tearfund. During my time there I worked alongside Tearfund's partner charity: the Garo Baptist Convention, and helped set up an advocacy training programme for communities in the North East Regions. Advocacy isn't common in Bangladesh, especially in the rural communities, as relationships with authorities such as the local government are very minimal, and corruption is often a major issue. The advocacy programme will train people in how to be advocates and provide them with a support network for the issues that need advocating for. It will encourage communities to work together and equip them with the ability to influence decision makers and tackle the problems they face. Your donations are instrumental in supporting the work of the Garo Baptist Convention and ensuring that the advocacy training programme can continue to grow and reach people throughout Bangladesh.

## **The People's Cathedral Project 2016 Achievements**

2016 was an exciting year for *The People's Cathedral* Project, which engaged with over 2800 people through a range of events from Archive talks, to Coffee Concerts to Family Fun Days. We have established new partnerships with organisations such as the Ecclesiastical Architects and Surveyors Association (EASA), Age UK Surrey and the Canterbury Centre, Guildford which will continue beyond the duration of the project. More volunteers have been recruited to support both new and existing roles within the Cathedral. Great interest has been generated in the Archive with volunteers cataloguing and digitising key aspects in order to populate our online searchable database <http://archive.guildford-cathedral.org/>

A dissertation project was completed on the Cathedral's kneelers and all have now been photographed and documented so that we can add images to our new touchscreens allowing all kneelers to be seen. More than 70 people have been interviewed as part of the Oral History Project and their memories of Guildford Cathedral from its construction through to the present day will feature in our new listening posts and will be used in our school workshops.

Some of the plans in development throughout 2017 include a new series of Heritage Talks at 2, Gravetalks, Coffee Concerts and Artist-in-Residence displays. More updates will follow soon.
