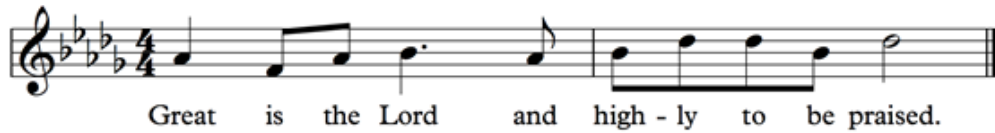
OLD TESTAMENT READING Zechariah 9.9-12 read by Matt O'Grady
