OLD TESTAMENT READING Genesis 22. 1-18 read by Andrew Hodges

After these things God tested Abraham. He said to him, 'Abraham!' And he said, 'Here I am.' He said, 'Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt-offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you.' So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt-offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. Then Abraham said to his young men, 'Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you.' Abraham took the wood of the burnt-offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, 'Father!' And he said, 'Here I am, my son.' He said, 'The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt-offering?' Abraham said, 'God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt-offering, my son.' So the two of them walked on together.

When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven, and said, 'Abraham, Abraham!' And he said, 'Here I am.' He said, 'Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me.' And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt-offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place 'The Lord will provide'; as it is said to this day, 'On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided.'

The angel of the Lord called to Abraham a second time from heaven, and said, 'By myself I have sworn, says the Lord: Because you have done this, and have not withheld your son, your only son, I will indeed bless you, and I will make your offspring as numerous as the stars of heaven and as the sand that is on the seashore. And your offspring shall possess the gate of their enemies, and by your offspring shall all the nations of the earth gain blessing for themselves, because you have obeyed my voice.'

NEW TESTAMENT READING Acts 8.26-end read by John Mitchell

Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, 'Get up and go towards the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.' (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go over to this chariot and join it.' So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: 'Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth.' The eunuch asked Philip, 'About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?'

Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?' He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Elections at the Annual Congregational Meeting

On Sunday 13 May elections will be held for the following – two members to serve on Chapter, one member to serve on Cathedral Council, one member to serve on the Cathedral Community Committee and four members to represent the Cathedral on Guildford Deanery Synod. The term of office for each is 3 years. A nomination form is included in the News Sheet. Each candidate must have a proposer and seconder and both of them and the candidate must be on the Cathedral Community Role. Completed nomination forms should be either left in the marked box on the Welcome Desk or left in the Cathedral Office marked Community Roll Officer.

Chapter – The Chapter is the 'Board of Directors' of the Cathedral and responsible for the strategic direction and resources of the Cathedral. Chapter meets for 3 hours each first Tuesday from 9.30am, except in August. Skills and experience required are in the broad areas of, for example, strategic planning, charity

and church governance and finance. Members of Chapter must be communicants in the Church of England. For more information please speak to the Dean.

Cathedral Council – the Cathedral Council serves as a board of reference for the work of Chapter and includes members who represent the widest possible life of the diocese. Council meets as least twice a year (and in practice between 4 and 6 times) on a weekday evening from 7.00pm. For more information please speak to Matt O’Grady who will put you in touch with the Chair of Council, Canon Peter Shaw.

Cathedral Community Committee - The responsibilities of the Community Committee are to encourage the worshipping and pastoral life of the Cathedral and its community by acting as a channel of communication between the Chapter and the Cathedral Community and advising Chapter on matters affecting the Cathedral Community. For more information please contact Linda Sharpin.

Guildford Deanery Synod – this is a tier of church government between the Diocesan Synod and the parishes. Deanery Synod considers matters passed to it by Diocesan or General Synod and others matters to do with mission and ministry in its area. Deanery Synod members are also the electorate for all elections to Diocesan Synod and General Synod. Guildford Deanery encompasses the parishes from the broad geographical area from Clandon and Merrow to Worplesdon, Park Barn, Wyke and Guildford Town. Deanery Synod meets four times a year in an evening at one of the churches in the Deanery. Cathedral Sound System

The Sound System working group met for the first time this week. Discussions centred on the problem with the system that causes a malfunction every six weeks, which is what caused the problem on Sunday 15 April. Parts have been ordered to rectify this, and if they have not arrived by 8 May, the system will be re-configured to give another six weeks grace. It was also identified that additional portable microphones are required so that each clergy member can have one tuned to their own voice characteristics, and that an extra loudspeaker is required in the Quire (in the choir stalls which recently were re-sited there after the move of the temporary organ). Four members of the congregation have agreed to help as we move things forward by monitoring the system’s performance and reporting back to the working group. Thanks to Ken Cornwell, Sue Howland, Janet Matthews and Donald Thompson for volunteering to do this. Other members of the congregation will be able to help by marking up problem areas on a plan of the Cathedral that will be placed at the back of the Nave for this purpose.
