NEW TESTAMENT READING James 2.1-10. 14-17 read by Liz Gruenstern

My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favouritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, 'Have a seat here, please', while to the one who is poor you say, 'Stand there', or, 'Sit at my feet', have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonoured the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? You do well if you really fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, 'You shall

You do well if you really fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it.

What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill', and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.


Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.



From there Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, 'Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' But she answered him, 'Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs.' Then he said to her, 'For saying that, you may go - the demon has left your daughter.' So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, 'Ephphatha', that is, 'Be opened.' And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, 'He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

WWI Centenary Events at Guildford Cathedral

The Cathedral is delighted to be working with Guildford Diocese, Surrey County Council, The Surrey Lieutenancy, Guildford Borough Council and The Royal British Legion on these events.

5 and 6 October 6.30pm Poppy Fields

Poppy Fields is the start of the program of events. A unique light and sound installation for two nights only. The Cathedral will open after dark and provide a sensory experience of light, music, art and poetry enabling reflection and contemplation and an opportunity to remember those who have served, both in the First World War and in all other conflicts. A beautiful sound artwork accompanies the installation and includes readings of World War One poems by Oscar Winning actor, Eddie Redmayne. Tickets are £5 and £2.50 for accompanied under 16's. 10 and 11 November

From 12.00 noon on Saturday 10 November, the Lord Lieutenant of Surrey, accompanied by our own Matt O'Grady and several other people will be abseiling from the Cathedral Tower in aid of the Royal British Legion. Whilst this goes on we have a military themed interactive afternoon on the Cathedral site during which, weather permitting, the Poppy Parachute Team, will be falling from the sky onto the Cathedral Green. The afternoon ends at 6.00pm with Choral Evensong with the Cathedral Choir and the Almac Bisley Brass Band. After Evensong the West End and South Side of the Cathedral will be illuminated by a projection of falling poppies. You may want to stay for a Poppy Dinner, with dishes from years gone by, in aid of the Royal British Legion. There will also be an auction and raffle. Early on Sunday 11 November, Surrey's leading dignitaries will climb the tower with the Dean and Bishop of Guildford, and at 6am they will be accompanied by a lone piper playing the traditional Scottish lament Battle's O'er. For those hardy souls wanting to witness this act of commemoration, please gather at the South Steps. Seasons Café will be open selling hot coffee and bacon rolls from 6.30am.

At 10am the Cathedral will host the Surrey County Service of Remembrance attended by the Lord Lieutenant, The Chairman of the County, the Surrey Yeomanry and other guests. This service concludes with a gun salute and two

minutes silence. At 12.30 the Cathedral Bell Ringers will return up the tower and our bells will be rung with every other Cathedral in the country and many other churches as part of our national commemorations.

At 6.55pm the Last Post will be sounded and then a Beacon of Light will be lit, symbolizing an end to the darkness of war and a return to the light of peace. The Guildford Town Cryer will then take part in 'A cry for peace around the world' as our Bell Ringers Ring out for Peace. These events are part of the national 'Battle's Over' commemoration.

As the ringers finish, we are delighted that Guildford Choral Society and the Cathedral Choir will sing Britten's War Requiem. Further details and tickets are available from: www.guildfordchoral.org/events/concerts
