OLD TESTAMENT READING Isaiah 6.1-8 read by Marlie Roes

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said: 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory.' NEW TESTAMENT READING | Corinthians 15.1-11 read by John Mitchell

Now I should remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you - unless you have come to believe in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to someone untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them - though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signalled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

We plan to offer you an Eco-Tip each month since we all need to become as ecologically aware and practical as possible to support the cathedral's progress. Here is the first one:

Eco-Tip Number One

One simple choice which has a number of positive effects, is to switch from using liquid soap to bar soap. Here are some of the benefits:

- *Bar soap packaging is more environmentally friendly – liquid soap can use 20 times more (plastic) packaging.*
- *Bar soaps don't contain as much water as liquid soaps; they tend to last a lot longer and are more cost effective.*
- *An attractive soap dish and scented soap can be an aesthetic addition to your cloakroom*
- *In terms of ingredients which minimise harm to fragile aquatic ecosystems, there are more options for environmentally friendly bar soaps than liquid soaps.*

Whether you use liquid or bar soap, do choose products formulated without palm oil to avoid harm to terrestrial ecosystems.
