Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity. I, the Teacher, when king over Israel in Jerusalem, applied my mind to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy business that God has given to human beings to be busy with. I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun; and see, all is vanity and a chasing after wind. I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the sun, seeing that I must leave it to those who come after me - and who knows whether they will be wise or foolish? Yet they will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity. So I turned and gave my heart up to despair concerning all the toil of my labours under the sun, because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by another who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a great evil. What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also is vanity.

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory. Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. But now you must get rid of all such things – anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

Shape of Sundays from 6 October

As from 6 October the 11.30am service on the first Sunday of the month will be a traditional rite Choral Eucharist. The 9.45am Cathedral Eucharist will be a shorter service and one which has more congregational participation, for example an additional hymn and congregational Gloria in Excelsis. This development will enhance what we offer on Sundays. We know that there are times when the traditional rite is not used at 9.45am because we are in particular seasons of the church year. By moving it to 11.30am we can be more certain that it will not be subject to seasonal variations. With regard to the 9.45am Cathedral Eucharist there was much feedback from our cathedral community last year that together 'we need to grow the congregation'. Clergy and Chapter have considered this and Chapter has invested in a whole new area of Family Engagement. Those who are unfamiliar with participating in worship need to encounter a warm welcome, accessible liturgy and encouragement to participate. To address this on the first Sunday of each month the 9.45am Cathedral Eucharist will have more opportunities for participation, more explanation in the service booklets and a shorter format. We will continue to offer Choral Mattins on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of the month. We will trial this for a year and then review. Any questions or comments can be made to any of the clergy.
